


Exterior Shutter Hardware Guide



Your exterior shutters may be hung in a variety of ways. Before you decide, learn more about the anatomy of a window and shutter hardware:


Traditionally, shutters attach to the home with hinges, comprised of straps and pintels:

- Straps are the component of the hinge that attach to the shutter. Straps are available in three styles: New York L Strap, Straight Strap, and Mid Strap.
- Pintels are the components of the hinge that attach to the house.
** Shutters need room to breathe and should be easily removed to allow for refinishing when required.*
- Shutters can also attach to the home with aesthetic mount kits.
- Shutters are held back against the home with S-holdbacks or bullet catches.

To hang your shutters in the traditional method, you will need two straps and two pintels per shutter, and one S-holdback or bullet catch per shutter. Our shutters are sold in pairs, so remember that for each pair of shutters, you will need four straps, four pintels (sold in sets of 4), and two S-holdbacks or bullet catches (sold in sets of 2).

→ Please note: Mounting through the shutter with fasteners is not recommended and voids the warranty.
